To whom it may concern,

Evolve Housing for Youth (EHY), formally Western Housing for Youth Ltd (WHY), is a division of Evolve Housing, a Tier – 1 registered Community Housing Provider (CHP). EHY provides transitional housing support services for young people aged 16 – 25 who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. EHY is located in Parramatta, Auburn and the Cumberland Local Government areas.

Milk Create Theatre and EHY worked collaboratively together in partnership in 2018. The program allowed for participants to express their creative side and contribute to forming ideas around their personal experiences with anxiety. The facilitators presented a safe environment for people from different cultures, ages, experiences to feel included and encouraged everyone to add ideas. Through the Milk Create Theatre program it provided an opportunity for our young people to gain confidence in a group setting, explore alternative avenues to express themselves and participate in the end of year performance at Parramatta Riverside Theatre.

From the success of 2018, EHY and Milk Create Theatre have recently started a new program for young people to get involved in the creative arts environment and are hoping to have continue success in years to come. One of our young people from last year had such a positive experience that he's returned back and wanting to pursue studying in the creative arts field.

I am writing to you in support of Milk Crate Theatre's application for multi-year funding.

I first came into contact with Milk Crate in 2016 as an associate artist for the Theatre of the Oppressed New York City (TONYC) International Residency with TOYNC Artistic Director, Katy Rubin. In late 2016 I was invited to facilitate as a lead artist in Milk Crate's community workshop series.

Since 2016 I have been a regular lead artist facilitator within their community creative workshop series delivering workshops at Parramatta Mission and Redfern Community Centre working with Milk Crate and Domestic Violence Service NSW creating a Women's Hub for those in the community who identify as female and with a lived experience of domestic violence. In 2017 I was invited to facilitate/direct a new Milk Crate Theatre production, That's The Spirit. The work was presented to Milk Crate community in free performances, as well as presented to high school students as part of Riverside Theatre's Education Program.

I regularly attend their artist feedback sessions and strategic planning days participated in their 2018 Scratch Night at the Eternity Theatre, as well as volunteering to deliver a series of workshops in Parramatta.

I value my working relationship with Milk Crate Theatre, and I am wholeheartedly invested in their vision and their community of artists. I have been able to witness and experience first hand the valuable contribution that they are making in changing people's lives, offering personal empowerment, social connection, skills development, and unique artistic expression. I feel valued and trusted as an artist, and thus able to create creative spaces for participants that encourage mutual respect, learning, and artistic growth.

What Milk Crate are able to achieve in both scope and ambition, with limited funds, modest resources, and a small team of highly motivated and dedicated staff, is nothing short of amazing.

With ongoing support, more time could be spent building on the potent internal mentoring programs they have successfully delivered, such as Headway, which has provided Milk Crate ensemble members with extraordinary up-skilling and bespoke creative trajectories that they would not be able to access anywhere else in the professional industry. It is these significant opportunities, and more, that could be afforded to more members in the future multi-year funding is available. Supporting Milk Crate Theatre is an investment in positive change, artistic rigor, and cultural diversity.

Multi-year funding would allow Milk Crate to be sustainable and effective moving forwards.
